



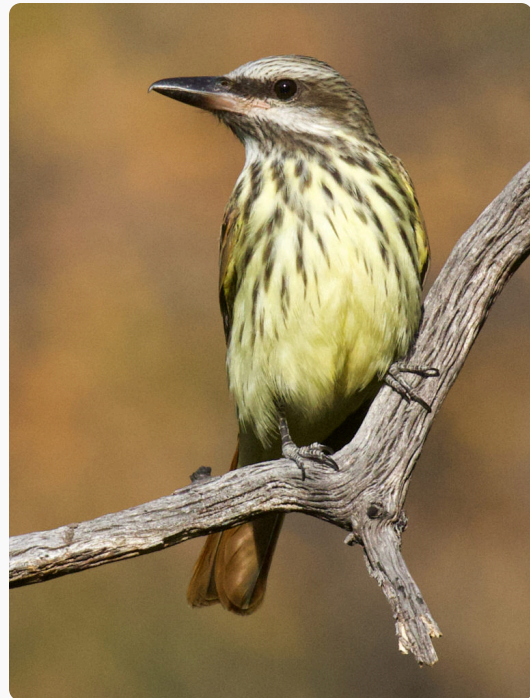

WHERE JULY BIRDING COMES ALIVE

July is one of the great months of summer birding, and the right destination makes all the difference. Across the country, breeding season is in full swing, with birds nesting, feeding young, defending territories, and filling the morning hours with activity.

For birders, this is a chance to observe behavior, habitat use, and family groups in ways that are easy to miss during migration. Monsoon landscapes, high-country forests, coastal wetlands, northern habitats, and cooler morning windows can all make July especially rewarding.

SOUTHWEST MONSOON BIRDING

July marks the beginning of monsoon season in the Southwest, one of the most distinctive birding windows of the year. Across Arizona, New Mexico, and West Texas, summer rains can bring renewed activity to canyons, grasslands, riparian corridors, desert foothills, and mountain habitats.

This is a rewarding season for hummingbirds, nightjars, owls, flycatchers, sparrows, buntings, and other regional specialties. A local guide can help you find productive sites while working around heat, storms, elevation, and timing.

HIGH COUNTRY MOUNTAIN BIRDING

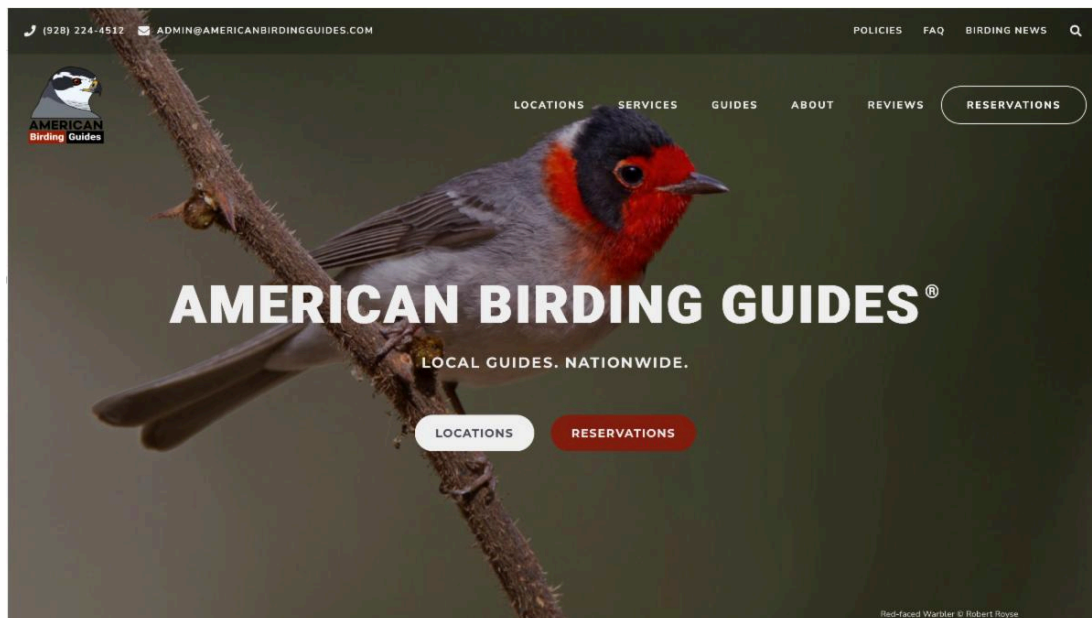
COASTAL & WETLAND BIRDING
